Corporate Authors	If a work has been composed by an institution without mention of a personal author the institution is called the corporate author. Corporate authors can be company names, name of an organisation, name of a club or society, government department and etc.

Abbreviations for subsequent footnotes

- 1. Give a full reference in a footnote the first time the source is mentioned (see Footnote 1).
- 2. When citing a source you have already cited, there is no need to repeat the reference in full. The abbreviation **lbid**, **op. cit.**, **supra note** can be used:
 - a. Use **Ibid** when two references <u>in a row</u> are from the same source (*see Footnote 2*). If you're referencing the same source but different page, follow **Ibid** with a comma and the page number(s) (*see Footnote 3*).
 - b. Use **op. cit.** when you have already given full details of that source in an earlier note. The abbreviation **op. cit.** is used with the author's last name and page number (see Footnote 5).
 - c. Use **supra note** when referring to the same source in a footnote that is not immediately above (for example on different pages). The abbreviation **supra note** is used with the author's last name, the footnote number where full reference is indicated and the page number(s) (see Footnote 7).
