Reference List Organization Guidelines:

- ❖ Every source cited within the text must be included in the reference list, and all items in the reference list must be cited in the text.
- ❖ References should be arranged in **alphabetical order based on the surname of the first author**.
For example:
Allison, T. (2025).
Davis, R. (2025).
Martinez, L., Nguyen, P., & Patel, S. (Eds.). (2025).
Walker, J. K. (2025).

- ❖ If authors share the same surname, entries should be ordered according to the **initials of their first names**. For example:
Taylor, A. (2025).
Taylor, B. (2025).

- ❖ When multiple works by the **same author** are listed, they should be arranged in **chronological order**, starting with the earliest publication. For example:
Rivera, M. (n.d.).
Rivera, M. (2025a).
Rivera, M. (2025b).
Rivera, M. (in press).

- ❖ If an author has **multiple publications in the same year**, these works should be organized alphabetically by their titles. Letter suffixes (a, b, c, etc.) should then be added to the year. For example:
Green, D. L. (2025a). Analysis...
Green, D. L. (2025b). Development...

- ❖ When entries begin with the same author, **single-author works should be listed before works with multiple authors**. For example:
Clark, Y. (2025).
Clark, Y., & Lopez, M. (2025).

- ❖ In the reference list, the names of organizations serving as authors must be written **in full**, without abbreviations or acronyms. Additionally, a **full stop must always appear at the end of the organization's name**.
Example:
European Association for International Education. (2025).

Abbreviations in APA 7 Style

- ❖ The use of abbreviations in APA 7 must follow specific rules depending on their function and position within a reference.

General Principles:

- ❖ Abbreviations should be used **sparingly and consistently**.
- ❖ Always follow **standard APA 7 formatting conventions** for placement and punctuation.
- ❖ Where APA 7 style requires full wording, **do not abbreviate**.

Example:

- ❖ **Chapter.** The word *Chapter* should **not be abbreviated**. Use **sentence case** when cited in-text: (Allison & Davids, 2025, Chapter 11)
Important! In most academic books, you should use page numbers instead of chapter numbers. Chapter number is used only when page numbers are unavailable (e.g., some e-books).

Abbreviations:

Ed. / Eds. (Editor / Editors)

- ❖ Used for editors and placed **in parentheses after the name(s)**.

Example:

Henderson, T. R. (Ed.). (2025). *Digital communication practices*. Columbia University Press.

ed. (Edition)

- ❖ Indicates the edition of a book.
- ❖ Placed **in parentheses after the title**, often with additional information such as page range.

Example:

Christus, S. (2025). Social structures and roles. In J. Adams & R. Lee (Eds.),
Perspectives in cultural anthropology (11th ed., pp. 261–289). Academic Press.

n.d. (no date)

- ❖ Used when no publication date is available. Replaces the year in the reference.

Example:

Walker, J. D. (n.d.). *Careers in forensic science*. Tower Publishing.

No. (Number)

- ❖ Used for reports, issue numbers, or series.
- ❖ Placed in **parentheses after the title**.

Example:

Christus, R. (2025). Exploring the impact of artificial intelligence on students' skills for sustainable development in education (Research Report No. 3). In *Frontiers in Education*. Springer.

p. / pp. (page / pages)

- Used to indicate page numbers. Always provide the **full-page range**.
- In references: included **within parentheses after titles**.
- In-text citations: placed **after the year**, separated by a comma.

Example (reference):

(pp. 82–170)

Example (in-text):

(Christus, 2025, pp. 88–333)

para. (paragraph)

- Used instead of page numbers when they are unavailable (e.g., online texts).
- Follows the same format as page numbers.

Example:

(Allison & Davids, 2025, para. 4)

Suffixes (Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.)

- For authors: placed **after initials**, separated by commas.
- For editors: placed **at the end of the name**.
- These suffixes are **included only in the reference list**, not in in-text citations.

Example:

Anderson, P., Jr., & Anderson, R. T., III. (2025). Historical narratives. *Journal of Cultural Research*, 1, 1–111.

doi (Digital Object Identifier)

- ❖ Included at the end of the reference.
- Must always follow the format: **https://doi.org/**

- ❖ Brandão, P. R. (2025). The impact of artificial intelligence on modern society. *AI*, 6(8), 190. <https://doi.org/10.3390/ai6080190>
